

## Small Trees for the Pacific Northwest

**Crape Myrtle (Lagerstroemia)** Crape myrtles are very resilient and can be planted most any time of year, even in summer — just be sure to water them well. Where to plant: Crape myrtles love the sun and are extremely heat tolerant. They should be planted in an area with at least 6 hours of sunlight per day. Some partial shade during the day is fine, but may result in fewer blooms,

### **Rebud Cercis Canadensis (Rising Sun)**

Rising Sun Redbud grows in full sun to part shade and are adaptable to any soil as long as there isn't standing water. This variety of redbud is the most tolerant of full sun. Introduced in 2020, this tree is spectacular! A brand new introduction from the JC Raulston Arboretum at NC State University, this is your opportunity to add a unique and rare tree to your personal garden or yard. A cross between the burgundy colored and golden redbuds, the Flame Thrower® displays up to five colors (burgundy, red, orange, yellow, lime) of foliage on each branch.

**Crabapple (Prairie Fire)** bears flowers in shades of white, pink and red, produces red berries in the Fall

**Chionanthus virginicus** is one of our nicest native plants, found naturally in the southeastern United States, but it is certainly hardy to at least zone 4. moist, acidic, fertile soils, but it is quite adaptable, making it a good candidate as a specimen shrub or small tree.

**Serviceberry (Amelanchier)** Full sun to part shade, well drained soil. Up to 25 ft. tall. Berries in the fall

**Flowering Dogwood (Cherokee Sunset)** Full sun to part shade, 15 to 30 ft. tall
